On behalf of my organisation, I declare support for the European Week 2006 Safe Start campaign which is dedicated to ensure that young people make a safe and healthy start to their working lives, and undertake to actively:

**Participate** in the European Week 2006 Safe Start campaign to make workplaces safer and healthier for young people at work, and for those about to enter the world of work

**Promote** risk assessment in the workplace, and/or risk prevention and risk education in schools, colleges and the wider youth and education community

**Prepare** young people for the world of work by involving young workers, their representatives, employers and supervisors, and/or individual schools, classrooms, training centres, and students themselves

**Publicise** activities widely, both internally and externally, and use the campaign logo

**Partner** other organisations where joint action is more likely to achieve the best results, and promote collaboration between enterprises and the youth and education communities

1. European Week 2006 Safe Start campaign activities must either relate to activities that seek to make workplaces safer and healthier for young people at work, or for those about to enter the world of work by promoting risk prevention and risk education in schools, colleges and the wider youth and education community

2. Actions can take place throughout the year, but should preferably take place during the European Week campaign, which is Week 43 (23-27 October 2006).

3. The official European Week 2006 campaign logo and slogan may be used on all material produced or used (such as posters, publications, advertisements, websites), in compliance with the accompanying rules. This is available in 20 languages and gives visibility to the activity, not only as a local, regional or national project, but also as part of a Europe-wide initiative.

4. Where possible, the activity should have a positive impact at workplace level and/or in the education community, incorporating insofar as possible the dual campaign objectives of awareness-raising and promoting good practice.

5. Such activity should involve young workers, their representatives, and their employers and supervisors. It also seeks to encourage the education community to prepare young people for work, and to involve individual schools, classrooms, training centres and students themselves, as the Agency promotes a partnership approach.

6. Measures should be taken to publicise the activity as far as possible in the general and specialist media, and through websites and Intranets where available.

7. If contacted by the Agency, details on actions undertaken should be provided for promotion purposes.
