In this part of the meeting, the purpose is to share experiences relating to the inspection for prevention of accidents at work, there are three relevant areas:

- **What is the policy and legislative framework relating to the preventive organisation system in place?** This can cover:
 - What accidents do enterprises have to record and report? (e.g., commuting accidents? All accidents? 3-day accidents?)
 - How do Labour inspectorates decide which accidents to investigate? How are fatal accidents handled vis-a-vis the police?
 - Are any sectors or worker-groups identified as being at “high risk” (e.g., education sector, health care workers, migrant workers)?
 - Are there any tools or guidance available on accident investigation – for enterprises or inspectorates?
- **How is the risk assessment for accidents at work carried out?**
 - Are prevention services used for the risk assessment process?
 - Does the Labour inspectorate have a strategy for investigation of accidents at work? (e.g., hazard or sector based?)
 - Are there any sectors or workplaces identified by the labour inspectorate as a priority?
- **How is information and training on accident prevention provided to workers?**
 - Induction training
 - Is the training outsourced?
 - How are the findings of an accident investigation shared with workers?
- **How is investigation of accidents at work carried out?**
 - What is the timeframe of reference for accidents at work?
 - Are workers involved in internal accident investigations?
